WOW! EYC was a blast! With 57 boats participating. it was the largest EYC regatta in the past 15 years! We heard nothing but good things about the regatta. Congratulations to Bill Visser and his crew of volunteers – they ran a great show! We wish to thank those of you who moved to an alternate slip so that we could accommodate the racing boats on E-dock. It made for a super gathering of racing enthusiasts.

The week after EYC the marina grounds was the backdrop for a beautiful private wedding for Dale O'Neil and Mercedes Telles of the yacht *Allegria*. This was another first for the marina and it was a delightful event. The bride looked stunning adorned with a flower crown and flowing, full length waterblue gown. She was escorted off *Allegria* by her smiling groom and son and the ceremony was filled with laughter, applause and tears of joy.

There are more than 50 new boats in Collins Bay Marina this season. Our boating community has a reputation for making new and visiting boaters welcome. We are certain that many of you are taking the opportunity to meet them and expand your own knowledge about boating as you chat.

Many of you will be thinking of exploring the US side of the lake this summer at such charming destinations as Sackets Harbour and Cape Vincent. The latest information that we have received concerning crossing into the US is that the I-68 program is still in use. The Canadian Border Boat Landing (I-68) Program allows certain applicants entering the United States by small boat to be inspected only once per year, and thereafter enter from time to time for recreational purposes without further inspection (however, you still must check in). For more information, check out <u>http://uscis.gov/graphics/publicaffairs/newsrels/</u> <u>boatlanding.htm</u>. Videophone entries are still an option when the alert level is at Yellow or below. They are suspended in Orange or Red levels and all boats must report in person at the staffed border entry point – Hart Island. Radio licenses (for the boat radio, not for the person), while no longer required in Canada, are still necessary if you travel to the US until a treaty is concluded.

We continue to work at improving the function and appearance of the marina. The rock edging and lawn improvements from A to E docks are now finished. Shortly we will be adding fresh gravel, grading it and applying calcium chloride to keep the dust down. We have also upgraded all of the dock lighting to energy conserving bulbs.

The reciprocal agreements are in place for another year. As always, your cooperation in letting us know when you are out of the marina helps us accommodate other boats under the program. Thanks for keeping us current on your cruising.

Summer is upon us. We trust that you are building a new set of memories. Remember – <u>these</u> are the "Good Old Days". Happy Sailing!

As newcomers to the CBYC Cruises, we continue to learn more Universal Truths.




# Waupoos Cruise!

Subject: NOTES FROM THE "GET 'ER DONE" CRUISERS Date: Wednesday, June 30, 2004 1:59 PM

Chuck feel free to edit this for purposes of the MIXER. It was nice that you and Karen saw fit to visit us and thank for that.

I'm sending off this missive from the Orillia library on a simply superb Friday. We've decided to lay over 3 days here to take advantage of the Canada Day celebrations. They are supposed to be pretty good here at the Port of Orillia Marina. Even a bunch of Yank boaters come here each year to take in the festivities. We've seen quite a few US boaters on our transit through the Trent Severn Waterway. We've transited 41 of the 45 locks on the TSW and are looking forward to completing the remaining 4, one of which is a railway lock at Big Chute.

We should complete this phase of the voyage and get our masts up by Sun 03 Jul. I for one am getting tired of being a "stink pot"! The TSW is a very impressive canal and the most exciting lifts to date have been the Peterborough and Kirkfield hydraulic lift locks. The Peterborough lock is the highest of its type in the world and it celebrates 100 years of operation this year. It lifts boats 65 feet in what amounts to huge bathtubs. We had an exciting moment on our lift in that the gates wouldn't open at the top of our lift so we were stuck 65 feet in the air floating in this thing. The women did not think that this was particular exciting and I have to ask why then were they excited??!

The flora and fauna of the TSW is absolutely amazing- ospreys abound with nests on poles (put there for this reason) and trees, there are abundant small fish for them to catch and feed their young (Dennis and I gave them some competition in that we caught about 30 small perch one afternoon and had a great fry for hor' deuvres). The route although in places is lined with old cottages and new obscene mansions also has many stretches of backwater (Ozarks) wetlands and trees overhanging the narrow passages. A beautiful doe was spotted taking a drink in a small cove. Water lands are perfect for our travels.

We have nicknamed Dennis variously "Rocky and Stumpy" and you'll have to guess why. He has also been entertaining us at trying various permutations and combinations as to how to enter and leave the locks. He's finally figured out that his 33 foot boat will not fit sideways in a 32 foot wide lock!!

The Girls are hanging on (no pun intended); spirits are high without the help of happy hour although that certainly does help; and you know that you are cruising when you add 10 garlic cloves to the homefries for breakfast! I have prepared 2 dozen pickled eggs which Janet will not let me serve. I intend to take them fishing once we get into the Georgian Bay!

July 16

Greetings from us all here and thanks to those who have been sending notes of encouragement and otherwise.

We have made it to THE BIG SOUND as folks here in Parry Sound refer to it. We have logged about 450 NM or 900 km so far and things have been going exceedingly well. We have really been enjoying the 30,000 Islands and have been staying at such places as Hockeystick, Copperhead island, Frying Pan Island, "The Boulevard", Rawson Bay in the Massassauga Park and Wreck Island, final resting place for the Waubuno a ship that sunk here in 1883 with the loss of all pax and crew. Wreck Island is a very interesting

place from a geological point of view. It has beautiful "artwork" put here by Mother Nature in the form of swirls and curls in the granite rock; pink, black and grey whites. We visited a place called Deerhorn Lodge on (wait for it) Deer Horn Island and had a nice Lodge Meal of salmon ,lamb and steak. This lodge has been going since 1902.

WE had an interesting night in 'The Boulevard', a very narrow channel between two extremely hard granite islands, famous as a spot for cliff jumping. The water is about 3m deep here and flat granite on the bottom. A number of thunder squalls came through at about 0230hrs and all of us were up in our gotches trying to keep off the granite cliffs. We suceeded and were delivered a lesson on anchoring in these parts!

The 30,000 Islands are a tad disappointing from the point of view that seemingly every single piece of rock here has some sort of human habitation on it ranging from small historic family cottages to the mega obscene monster summer homes. We understand that these will thin out as we get further north towards Bing Inlet and Killarney. The Group of Seven, despite their talents have not been able to do justice to the beauty of the landscape here. Those White Pines eeking out a living on the granite rock with all their branches pointing away from the prevailing winds are something to behold.

Dennis and I have been doing a fair bit of fishing and we enjoyed a BBQ'd pike last night for supper. I caught a 3 1/2 smallmouth which jumped like an Atlantic Salmon. I released it, as it well deserved after having put on such a show!

We haven't been doing much actual sailing but primarily motor sailing due to the lack of searoom in the small craft channel. Some places are barely wide enough for one boat. We expect to be moving more out into the Georgian Bay as the 30,000 Islands begin to thin out. We will be leaving here on Sun and I have no idea when i will next find an Internet terminal.

#### Sailing School News

Well, we're half way through and the Sailing School is going extremely well this year. Enrollment is way up over 2003. Our first two sessions for White Sail Youth were full at 20 each and our July session for adults was full at 10. The Bronze sessions have little space with seven in Bronze IV and five students in Bronze V. August is shaping up to be almost full in the youth session, and about half full for the Adults. I don't know if it's because of the Olympics this year or that people are really catching on to the fact that Kingston is a great place for sailing - but there are certainly no complaints regarding the 2004 enrollment numbers.

The Sailing School was able to add a boat to our coaching fleet this year. Each of our three instructors now have their own boat which provides even better on-the-water instruction for our students. We also have given each of our youth sailors a new CBYC Sailing School t-shirt this year. Thank you to Collins Bay Marina for supporting the Sailing School by funding these shirts. Why not provide our students with a keepsake from their summer sailing adventures - and do a little advertising at the same time.

When we are able, the Sailing School is pleased to give something back to the Kingston Community. In 2003 we joined on as a proud supporter of the PRO Kids Programme co-ordinated by the City's Cultural Services Department. This summer, the Sailing School made a financial contribution to Kingston's own Sail for Gold team, Oskar Johansson and John Curtis, who are competing at the Olympics this month in the Tornado class. It is anticipated that Oskar and John will be able to pay a short visit to our students just prior to their leaving for Greece. Who knows, maybe one of our own Sailing School graduates will one day go on to seek gold in some future Olympiad.
